UNBEATEN BEES HIT ROAD,

GO AFTER NUMBER 14

Eisenhower's unsung miracle workers, Coach Walt Wohlers' "B" footballers do battle with the explosive Highlanders at Upland in an afternoon clash. Kickoff is at 3:15.

A week ago, Claremont's puppypack came close before falling 12-7 on the strength of a three yard plunge by Carl Gunn and a timely 75-yard kickoff return by soph Allan Schultz. That wrapped up the scoring as booting specialist Larry Leppard—someone the varsity could use—had one PAT attempt blocked and sent the other wide.

Those Bees seem to make a habit of running back kickoffs all the way. A week earlier Donnie Ellenburg went up the middle eighty yards, one of three six-pointers he got that day in a 38-7 rout.

Following an old tradition, one only the Almighty understands, Eisenhower's winningest team gets about as much recognition as the school's champion basket-weavers. This is the first article about the squad since mid-September.

And don't forget Coach Dick King, defensive boss and head baseball mentor in the spring. His boys have been little short of spectacular all season. Sophs Paul Brown, Steve Riley and Greg Furnace and Schultz plus a half-dozen others have been outstanding.

Happily, the early season loss of Don Campbell—quite a jolt at the time—has been well overcome. Another tenth grader, Mike Minton, has been guiding the white-hot offensive the way John Blair did a year ago.

Wolf Pack Blank Eagles 14-0

Eisenhower's travel-sore Eagles in danger of a losing season for the first time in their grid history dropped another bad one 1-0 at title bound Claremont. After a scoreless first half, in which both sides went up and down, all over the field, two unexpected bombs broke the game apart, an 80-yard Scott Conner to Bob Jones pass, and a 27 yard end sweep.

In the afternoon preliminary, Coach Walt Wohler's defending co-champion Bees knocked off the unbeaten Wolfpack in route to their 13th straight triumph, 12-7.
