## Rev. Richards Bestows Honor on Gymnasium

On January 22, 1962 Guy Hogle, A.S.B. president turned the first spadeful of earth to commence the building of the E.H.S. gymnasium. Last night, one year and one week later, 1963 A.S.B. President Randy Wheaton was presented

the key to the \$350,000 building. Roy Chapman, President of the Board of Education, made the presentation at the dedication ceremony.

Present at the occasion was Mr. F. Eugene Mueller, Superintendent San Bernardino Schools. Mr. Mueller "vigorously" stressed the importance of the gymnasium in the Physical Fitness Program. He stated that the Eisenhower High School structure is "the finest of three gymnasiums" (S.B.H.S., Pacific, E.H.S.).

Reverend Bob Richards, Director of the Wheaties Foundation and twice Olympic pole vault champion, gave the dedicatory address. He emphasized the co-ordination of the body and the mind in attaining one's goal.

"Think," was the Reverend's key word. "The world," he said, "is begging for young people who think." He said that in any walk of life good planning is essential.

In correlation with thinking, Reverend Richards stressed the need of sacrifice. Using personal experiences as a base, he animated his thoughts to all present.

Randy Wheaton concluded the E.H.S. Gymnaisum Dedication by leading the Alma Mater.

## WESTINGHOUSE SCIENCE TALENT WINNER ENABLES EHS TO RANK AS "HONOR SCHOOL"

ANITA WARE, EHS senior, has placed in the top forty in the nationwide Westinghouse Science Talent Search. This distinction has enabled EHS to be titled an "Honor School," ranking it among 20 in California's total of 650 High schools. This contest, held in Washington D.C., had 22,000 applicants and 4,000 entries from high school seniors all over the nation.

To enter this science search, Anita had to take a two hour exam, submit a research paper explaining the findings of here experiment in the field of experimental psychology, the phenomenon of sound imprinting, and fill out a five-page personal reference besides entering her project.

Besides Anita, one girl from SBHS also placed in the top 10%. Last year, a girl from Pacific High placed in the top forty. These two students were the first in many years from the San Bernardino School system to have placed in the Westinghouse Contest, which has been operating for 22 years.

## California Funeral Directors Offer Scholarships To Mortuary Schools

For students who are interested in a scholarship in the funeral service, the California Funeral Directors Association is offering scholarships.

A scholarship in Northern California and another in Southern California are awarded annually to help defray the quarterly tuition costs at the respective Mortuary Science Colleges in California. Each \$750 scholarship will be granted before May 1 for use the following year.

The scholarships can be used at either the California College of Mortuary Science at Los Angeles or the San Francisco College of Mortuary Science. Applicants must meet the following qualifications:

Age: Between 18 and 25 years of age.

Pre-mortuary College Education: Completion of High School Education. Any student in his senior year who has completed three and one-half years of high school may apply.

Residence: One scholarship is reserved for applicants who live in the Association's Northern District, and one scholarship is reserved for applicants who live in the Association's Southern District.

The Scholarship Awards and Grants committee will evaluate all applicants and select the successful candidates and alternates for each scholarship.

## Groans And Moans - - - It's Physical Fitness Time at EHS

"(Groan), I'm dying! Ohhhhh, I hurt all over." Sound familiar? It should, for these are just a few of the complaints to be heard around the EHS campus at physical fitness testing time. Well gang, grin and bear it, 'cause physical fitness testing is here to stay, or so say Mrs. Probst and Miss Sepulveda of the P.E. department.

How do EHS students (girls) shape up against other students across the nation? According to Mrs. Probst, "Very poorly about 50% of my girls rate in the "poor" category." Miss Sepulveda however, says her girls are doing fairly well, although both teacher agree that there has been little noticeable improvement since the first physical fitness tests of the year in October.

## Bees Duel Corona In Series Finale

Eisenhower's fast and furious Bees battle the host Panther-Cubs at Corona in the "rubber-game" of their deadlocked basketball series. In their initial encounter in the finals of Corona's own B-Tournament, Corona prevailed, while lke's baby-weights squared the count in the Tri-County League lid-lifter, 37-24, during Christmas vacation.

Coach Earl Nesse, who employs run-run tactics balanced by a ballhawking zone defense, could start any one of a half-dozen combinations for tonight's 7:00 contest. But it will definitely include at one position or another — since Coach Nesse enjoys shuffling players all over the court — Kent Pattee, sophomore; Jerry Russell, soph; Ernie Galien, soph; John Powers, junior; and Gary Ray, junior. Just on the outside, but sure to see action are John Dahland and Steve Reiley, another pair of sophomores.

A real surprise and late bloomer has been Ray, a wirey front-court man, who has been sweeping the boards and hitting from the outside in the last three outings. But he is still being pushed by a newcomer to Eisenhower, slender David Adams, who shoots with the touch of a craftsman but being small has trouble rebounding and belongs in the backcourt. only the first half to knocck off a weak Claremont five. The wolfpack was obviously looking ahead to next year, with two juniors and a sophomore on their first line.

Tony Radcliffe, turning in a full night's work in the first 16 minutes, scored 14 of the Eagle's 30 points in the first half, and then took the rest of the night off. Radcliffe was joined in double figures by Captain Gary Barnes, making up for lost time, with 14 points and junior letterman John Blair with 12. Just out of the tens column with nine was Ike's top man off the boards, Bill Potter (see photo).

The Wolfpack joined the list of teams who have been athoroughly perplexed with Eisenhower's air tight defense. **Potter, Radcliffe and Fred Cowart have been downright stingy**, allowing the opposition no more than five or six clear shots from inside the key per game. For example the total Cavalier offense through the first half of the Montclair game was one lonely field goal (scored on a jump shot from 15 feet out) plus a few charity tosses.

Attendance has fallen off in the last three contests, but a large aggregation is expected to make the trip tonight. The tip-off is set for around 8:30 following the Bee contest which gets under way at 7.
