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County Students Chosen For Governor's Academic Recognition Program

SAN BERNARDINO – Seven high school senior students from San Bernardino County have been selected to take part in the first Governor's Academic Recognition Program, County Superintendent Herbert Fischer announced today.

The seven students are among 177 chosen statewide to compete for 25 all-state academic team spots. The group of 177 students will be honored on March 11 at an awards dinner with Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and First Lady Maria Shriver, where the all-state academic choices will be announced.

"These students represent the academic firepower of our county," Fischer said. "We are extremely pleased that these outstanding students will be recognized statewide."

The seven San Bernardino County students were chosen from 39 nominees, who represented 36 comprehensive high schools, one charter school and two continuation high schools countywide.

For the countywide selection, high schools were asked to submit seniors from the top 1 percent of their graduating classes for consideration from a panel who reviewed the submissions. Selections were based on scholastic achievement, leadership qualities, extracurricular activities and service to the community. The number of statewide nominees were determined by the secretary of education's office and based on student enrollment by county.
