Climbing aboard the special Santa Fe train car, EHS students Gayle Patterson, Dennis Haaf, Neta Hendricks, Pam Parlette, and Chiliean student Eugenia Jimenez, were greeted by former First Lady, Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower, on April

In an interview granted to the students, Mrs. Eisenhower gave her opinion on subjects ranging from the woman of today, to the weather in California.

Mrs. Eisenhower stated that she is satisfied to be a homemaker. "It has been one of the most interesting and rewarding parts of my life." The secret of her 49 years of marriage, she attributes to her willingness to allow her husband to be the head of the house.

"It is wonderful for a woman to have a career to fall back on, to be prepared if something should happen to her husband. In my day, women did not study to do anything outside the home," she declared.

According to Mrs. Eisenhower, she and the General are drawn to California because of the dry climate, and so they can be near the mountains. With a smile she added, "And the General can play golf."

Mrs. Eisenhower said that during her eight years as First Lady, she was never concerned with whether the women attending White House affairs were Republican or Democrat.

Turning the conversation to politics, she said that communities should take a more active interest in helping themselves rather than allowing the federal government to do things for the community.

At the close of the interview, General Eisenhower came into the room for a brief chat with the students, and posed for some pictures.

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



"It is simply unbelievable," said Mrs. Holm. "One could not imagine what it would be like unless he saw it."







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
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
Kar Korner



Pushing its way into Kar around it. Korner this issue is Bob Green's '57 Ford. This unusual car is finished in a flat black primer finish with most of the exterior chrome removed. Bob's Fairlane 500 is running 7.50 x 14's all around centered by chrome several rims with three pronged knock-offs. Each tire has a red crayon stripe

When Green pops the hood, he is proud to display a 312 cubic inch Thunderbird engine. A new addition to the top of the mill is three Holly, two barrels mounting on an Edlebrock manifold with progressive linkage. Deep in the heart of the muscular mill is a full race and Iskendarian cam. Bob's







engine is topped off with a few chrome goodies, such as valve covers, oil breather cap, etc.

Stepping inside of the furious Ford, the interior is done in flat black naugahyde. The dash is covered with Stewart-Warner gauges and all of the glass on the dash is finished in candy sapphire blue. More custom goodies include small blue metal flake steering wheel and Cadillac radio.

On the tunnel, we find a Hollywood straight line floor shift which control a stock three speed and rear end.

Future plans for Bob's car include a candy blue paint job and perhaps a light blue metal flake top. He wants to bore the engine out to a 352 and shorten the stroke. Of course, with this size power plant, he intends to install a big limited-slip differential rear end and maybe a competition four-speed and Racemaster slicks. If you look close, Bob will probably be haunting the drags by the end of the summer.

Another feature this week in Kar Korner is Craig Johnson's 63 Chevy Impala Super Sport. His car is finished in Meridian Red and is high-lighted by E.T. Mags all around. The interior is a standard black super sport finish with wood paneling on the dash and console. Another feature is his Muntz stereo pack working in conjunction with four speakers which have been mounted in the doors.

The engine is a Chevy 490 with a Duntoff Fuel Injection cam and a Carter A.F.B. — E. series quad. His 4:11 rear end is turned by a stock fourspeed transmission with special Corvette short-throw linkage.

Future plans include 302 — 7.5 gram hydraulic Isky cam. He would also like to add a few more luxury items on the interior.

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Varsity Spikemen Capture Second In Ivy League

Tonight, members of the Ike track squad will be displaying some of their finest efforts in the Ivy League Finals at Colton.

The competition will be extremely rough in this final meet of the season and each participant will be struggling for top honors in the league. Thus, many school records are likely to fall tonight as each athlete from the six Ivy League schools attempts to maintain the old track adage: "higher, faster, farther".

Usually, these big league meets are both exciting and colorful. In addition, there is always enough variation between the different events to capture the attention of almost any track fan.

In individual events, it is hard to even speculate who the winner will be, because each Eisenhower participant will meet fairly equally matched competition. For example, Ike's distance runners well know that Colton runners aren't going to be easy to surpass.

Karl Henry might have to sweat a little in the two mile against Colton's top competitor. In the half mile race, Ike runners will probably find that one of Corona's runners isn't going to

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be easy to beat. Also, shot putter John Grenfell will have a tough battle with Rubidoux's best man, while "jumping" Jeff Ellerbrock will have to step out in order to win the hurdle events. However, in the long run, I would say that the Ike squad is in pretty good shape.

Perhaps a quick glance at the season record might give an indication of the chances each Eisenhower athlete will actually have in tonight's meet.

Eisenhower's varsity finished second in the league, winning four meets and losing one. However, the bee and cee teams didn't do as well.

After tallying individual efforts this season, Jeff Ellerbrock received high point honors on the varsity team with 821/4 points, while Steve Monreal gained the most points on the bee team, $42\frac{1}{2}$ points, and Jim Gensichen was high point man on the cee team with $81\frac{3}{4}$ points.

Moreover, a number of records have fallen this year and possibly more will fall tonight. In the long jump John Pitts shattered the old varsity record of 20 ft. 10 in. to set a new 22 foot record and he added 11 in. to the old bee record for a new mark at 21 ft. 7 in. Shot putter John Grenfell moved the old varsity shot put record of 50 ft. 9 in. to a new 52 ft. 23/4 in., and Chris Grefnell added inches to the 48 ft. 7 in. cee record reaching a new 53 ft. 8 in. mark. In addition Karl Henry established a quick 9:54 record in the new two mile race and Jeff Ellerbrock tied the 20.2 record in the 180 yd. low hurdles.

Ike Racketmen Hold Second In League

Downing the Norte Vista Braves last Friday, Coach Bill Fox's varsity tennis team moved into a second place position in the league standings.

Coach Fox commented that Fontana presently holds the first place berth in the league, but if Colton beats the Steelers, Eisenhower will tie Fontana for a league first. He went on to say that last Tuesday's victory over Fontana was one of Ike's key victories in league competition. Also, coach Fox commented that Joe Baron's win and Bob Pingle's victory in the singles were for two crucial victories in the meet.

In closing, Coach Fox stated, "The team has done a fine job this year and we're proud of them.

Norte Vista Down Ike Baseball Squad

Norte Vista bombed out an 8-5 extra inning victory over the slumping Eisenhower Eagles with a story-book homerun in the bottom of the ninth inning.

The three run blast, the third Brave round tripper of the game, sent the Eagles into undisputed possession of the Ivy League cellar.

Coach Dick King started south paw hurler Jim Goddard. He was followed to the mound by Rick Zadalis, Bob Thomas, and finally, Mel Henry.

Catcher Bobby Gire played a fine game, and led all hitters with three hits. Dennis Grondin, Bill Bishoff, and Larry Lewis also helped the Eagles stretch the game into extra frames by chipping in two hits apiece.

Finishing the dual meet season in the second place birth, Eisenhower's varsity track team smashed Rubidoux, 76-37, in a breezy home meet last Friday.

Eisenhower's distance runners, coached by Roy Harkin, excelled in each of the three varsity distance races, capturing firsts, seconds and thirds in the mile, two mile, and half mile.

Versatile Karl Henry stepped out for a quick first place in the two mile race, clocking a 10:11.7. Although his time wasn't as quick as it has been in the past, he managed to lap some of his opponents.

Mike Wilber led the half mile as Eisenhower swept that event, and Tony Hernandez captured a first in the mile while his teammates picked up a second and a third.

Hurdle star Jeff Ellerbrock presented a first place performance in the 120 high hurdles with a time of 15.9 However, Terry Norton grabbed a first in the 180 low hurdles with a quick 19.6.

Although Rubidoux majored in sprint races, quarter miler Ed Kashak produced Ike's only sprint victory breaking the tape at 54.6.

Also, the Rubidoux Falcons made heavy gains in the field events, but John Pitts managed a first in the long jump.
